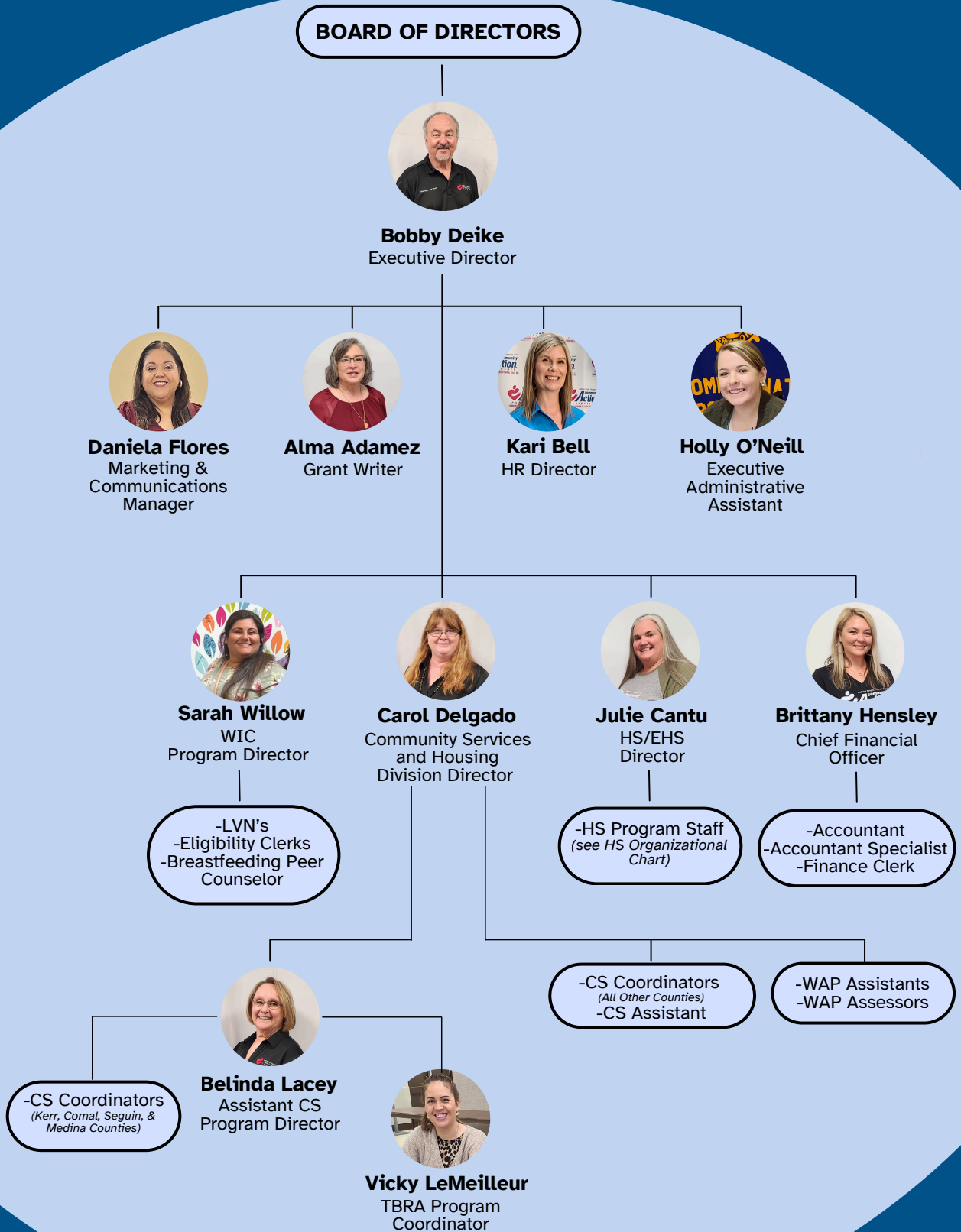

## *A Message from our Executive Director...*

I'm honored to share the 2025 CCSCT Annual Report with our elected officials, funders, community leaders, partners, and the communities we proudly serve. This year was especially meaningful for our organization, as we reached a remarkable milestone: 60 years of service. For six decades, Community Council of South Central Texas has stood beside families during their most difficult moments, helping them overcome barriers and move toward stability and self sufficiency. In 2025, we had the privilege of celebrating this legacy with a special anniversary event that brought together staff, partners, leaders, and friends of Community Action to reflect on the lives changed and the communities strengthened through this work.

Our mission was tested yet again when the devastating flooding struck the Texas Hill Country and Seguin, Texas on July 4, 2025. In the face of tragedy, CCSCT did what Community Action Agencies have done for generations: we showed up. Our staff immediately mobilized, traveling to Kerrville and surrounding communities to assist families who had lost so much. They worked tirelessly to provide utility assistance, temporary housing, rent and mortgage support, and HEB gift cards so families could purchase essential items such as food, clothing, and fuel. Long days turned into late nights and weekends, but our team remained committed to ensuring that every person seeking help was treated with dignity and compassion.

During this response, I also witnessed something powerful: the strength of the Community Action network across Texas. When communities hurt, Community Action responds together. Greater East Texas Community Action Program from Nacogdoches, Combined Community Action from Giddings, and Panhandle Community Services from Amarillo sent staff to stand beside CCSCT in Kerr and Kendall Counties. GETCAP even deployed their Outreach Trailer filled with supplies to support families in need. Their willingness to travel across the state to help our neighbors is a powerful reminder that Community Action is more than a network of agencies. It is a family united by the belief that no community should face hardship alone.

As we reflect on this milestone year and the work accomplished in 2025, I am deeply grateful for the people who make this mission possible every day. 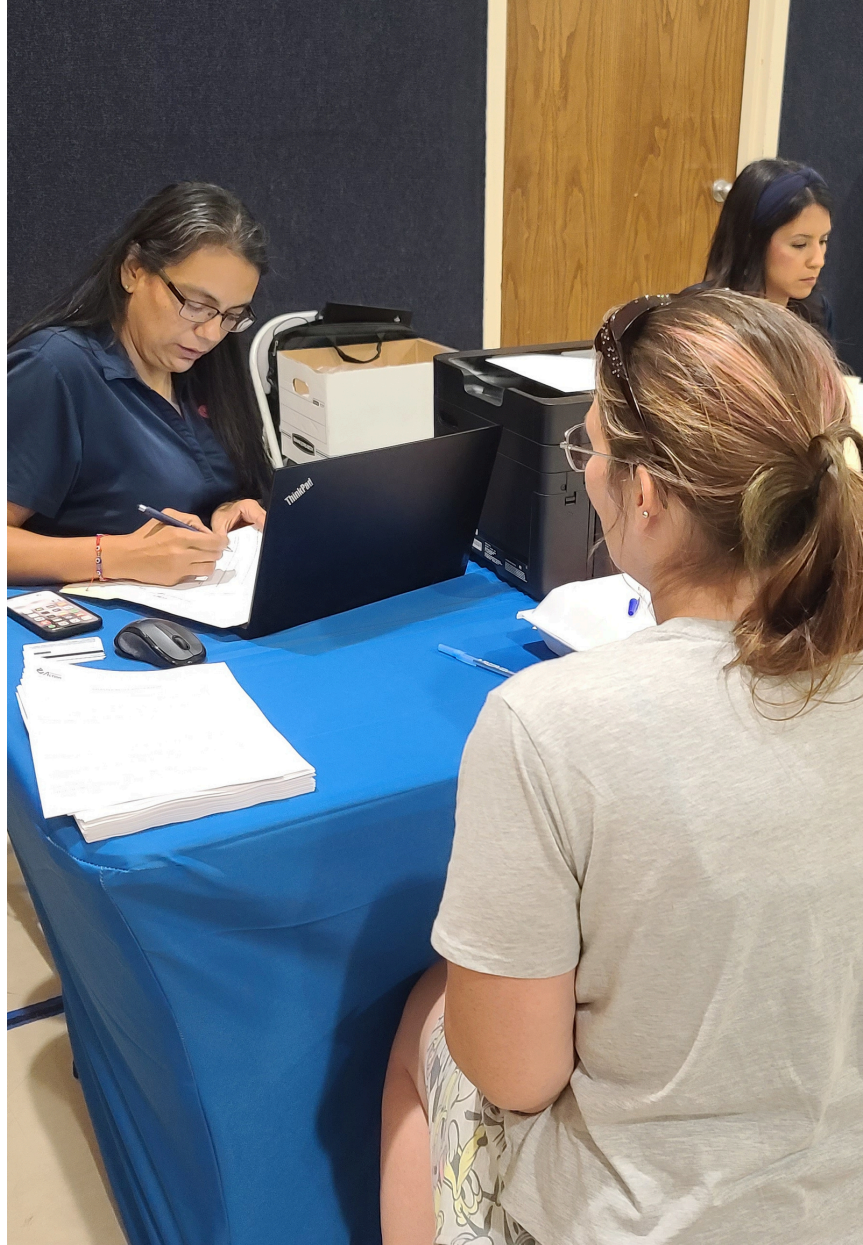
## ABOUT US:

On May 11, 1965 the Community Council of Comal County was established as a private non-profit corporation, funded through the Office of Economic Opportunity. On September 3, 1965, the Articles of Incorporation were changed to reflect the addition of Blanco County to the service area and the name of the agency was changed to Community Council of Blanco and Comal Counties, Inc. On March 25, 1971, the name of the corporation was again changed to the Community Council of South Central Texas, Inc. to conveniently allow for future expansion of the prescribed service area.

As the service delivery agency to low-income households, CCSCT will continue to identify needs, prioritize them, and stimulate, promote, secure, and use all available resources (federal, state, and local) to alleviate poverty. It is our intent to enable low-income individuals and families to acquire the skills and knowledge to secure the necessary opportunities to become fully self-sufficient.

CCSCT serves low-income families and individuals in 31 counties in greater South Central and West Texas. Those counties

include: Atascosa, Bandera, Bee, Brewster, Comal, Culberson, Crane, Dimmit, Edwards, Frio, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, Kinney, LaSalle, Live Oak, Maverick, Medina, McMullen, Pecos, Presidio, Real, Terrell, Uvalde, Val Verde, Wilson and Zavala. It should be noted that each program may be authorized by its funding source to serve either additional counties or less than the counties specified.

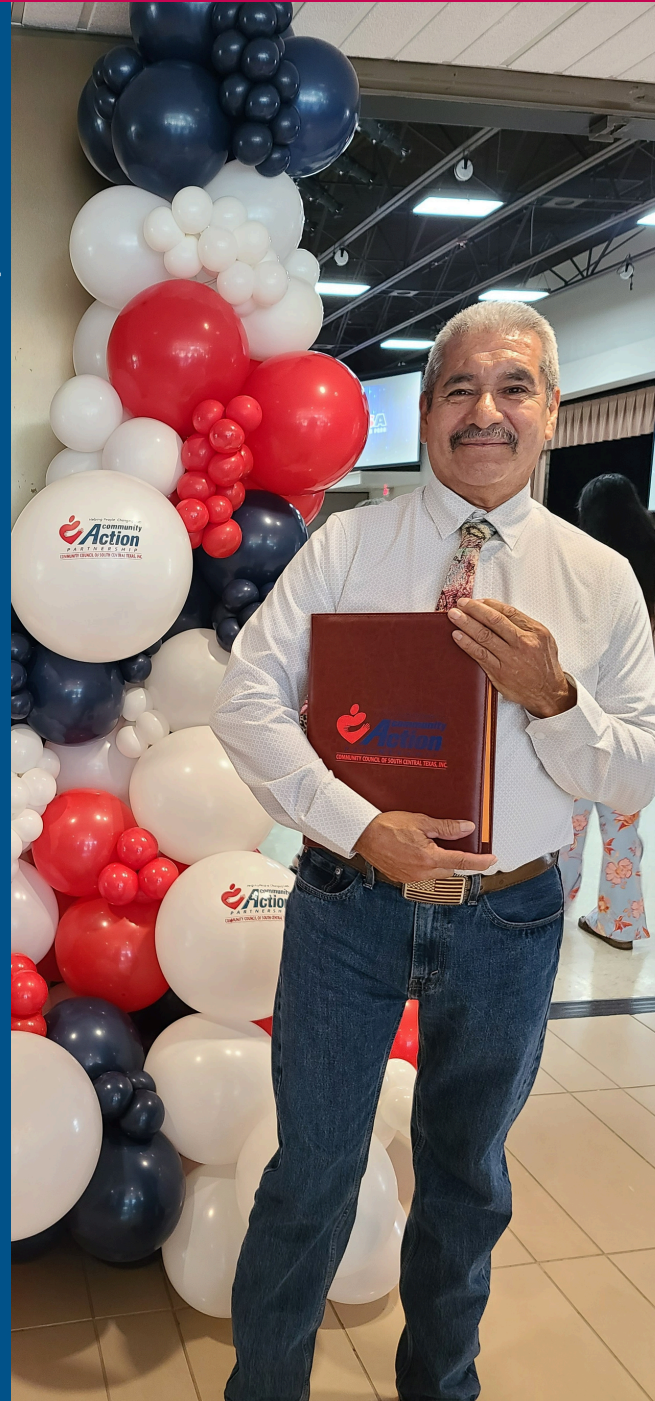

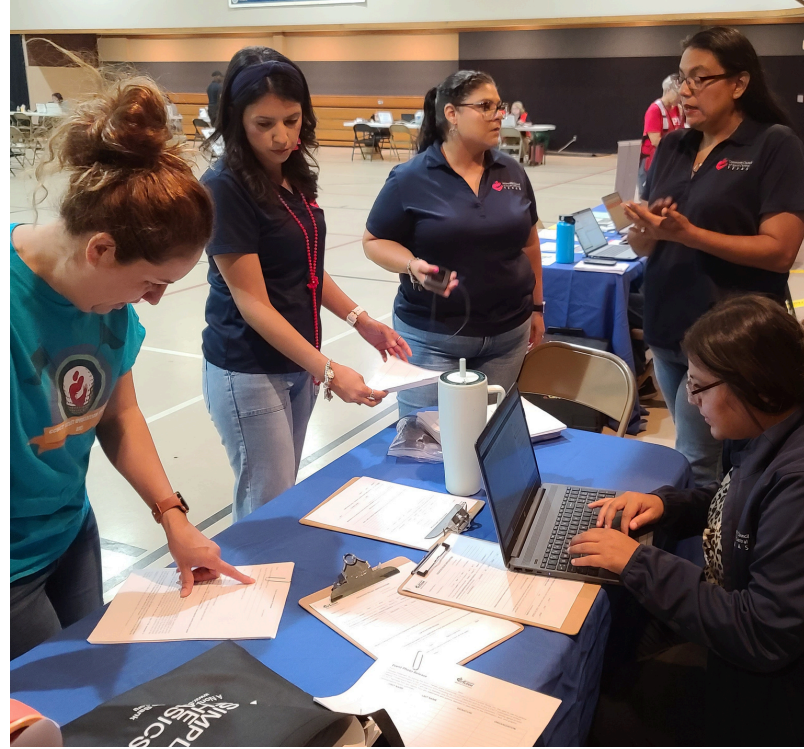
# Hill Country & Guadalupe County Flood Crisis Response



In the aftermath of devastating floods across the Hill Country and Guadalupe County, CCSC quickly mobilized to support affected families with emergency services including rent and mortgage assistance, utility assistance, case management, hotel stays, heavy duty cleaning supplies and HEB Gift cards for essentials. CCSC staff worked tirelessly on the ground, helping residents stabilize and begin the road to recovery. In true Community Action spirit, agencies from across Texas stepped in to help. Greater East Texas Community Action Program, Combined Community Action, and Panhandle Community Services sent staff to stand beside CCSC in Kerr and Kendall Counties. GETCAP even deployed its Outreach Trailer stocked with supplies. When communities hurt, Community Action responds together—proving this network is truly a family committed to ensuring no community faces hardship alone.

To honor this incredible dedication, staff were recognized with a heartfelt “Thank You” BBQ lunch in Hondo, where colleagues gathered to relax, share laughs over bingo, and enjoy making crafts together—a small but meaningful gesture of gratitude for their tireless compassion and service.

These emergency efforts were funded through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs, the Community Services Block Grant, Methodist Healthcare Ministries, and TXU Energy.

Office staff is amazing and willing to go beyond for everyone!

I am a single mother of three children, two of whom have disabilities. Recently, I lost the housing assistance that had been helping my family stay stable. Without employment and while caring for my children and their special needs, I quickly found myself struggling to keep up with basic household expenses. I was afraid that we might fall behind on rent and have our electricity disconnected, which would have put my children's well-being and our housing stability at risk.

When I reached out to the program for help, the staff guided me through the process and treated me with understanding and respect. Through their assistance, I was able to receive rental assistance and help with my electricity bill, which prevented our utilities from being disconnected and allowed us to remain in our home.

This support helped stabilize my household during a very difficult time. Because of this assistance, my family was able to maintain safe housing and essential utilities while I focused on caring for my children and working toward improving our situation. Programs like this make a real difference for families like mine by preventing housing instability and helping families remain safe and secure.

# Community Comments and Stories

Mr. Eggleston's story is a profound example of why digital equity is a necessity, not a luxury. As a veteran living in a rural area with no family and only a bicycle for transportation, he was essentially cut off from the services he earned. He desperately needed to apply for Social Security benefits to supplement his limited income, but he was trapped by a modern 'digital catch-22': the Social Security Administration now requires a phone number to process applications, yet Mr. Eggleston could not afford a phone or a service plan.

Furthermore, the nearest Social Security office is in Kerrville, Texas, a distance impossible to cover on a bicycle from his home in Campwood which would be 6 hours and 40 minutes on a bike.

Thanks to the resources provided by this grant, our Digital Connector was able to step in. We first helped him apply for the Lifeline program, securing him a free smartphone and monthly service. Once his digital 'identity' was established with that phone number, we used our lab equipment to help him navigate the online Social Security application process. By bridging this digital gap, we didn't just give him a phone; we gave him a way to access the financial support he needs to survive.

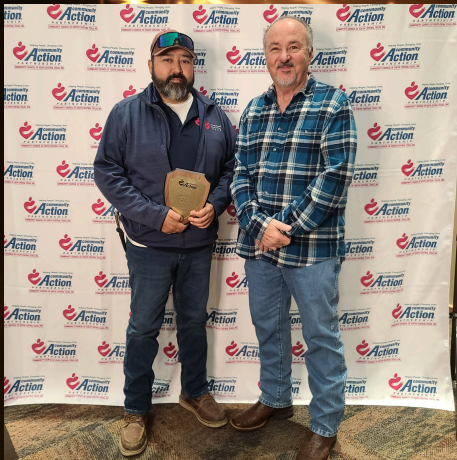

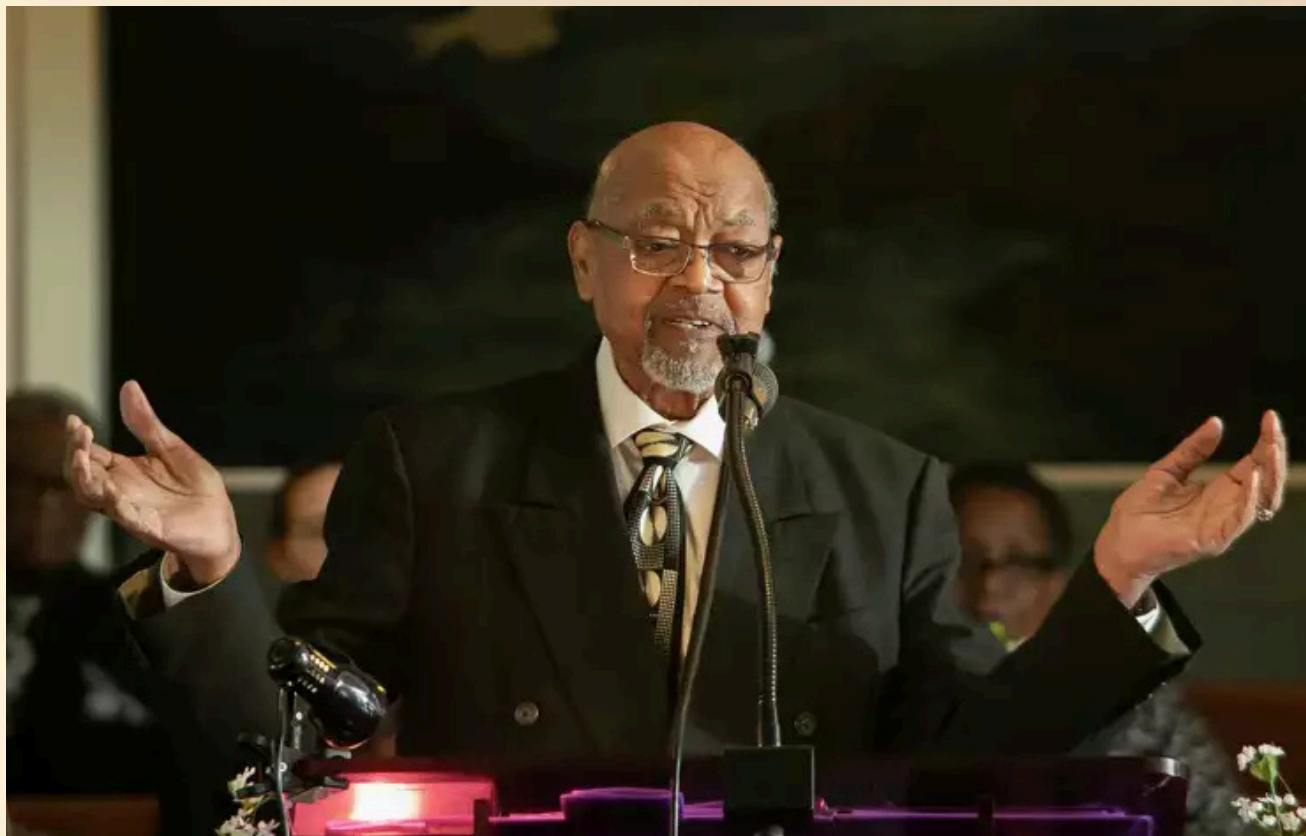
